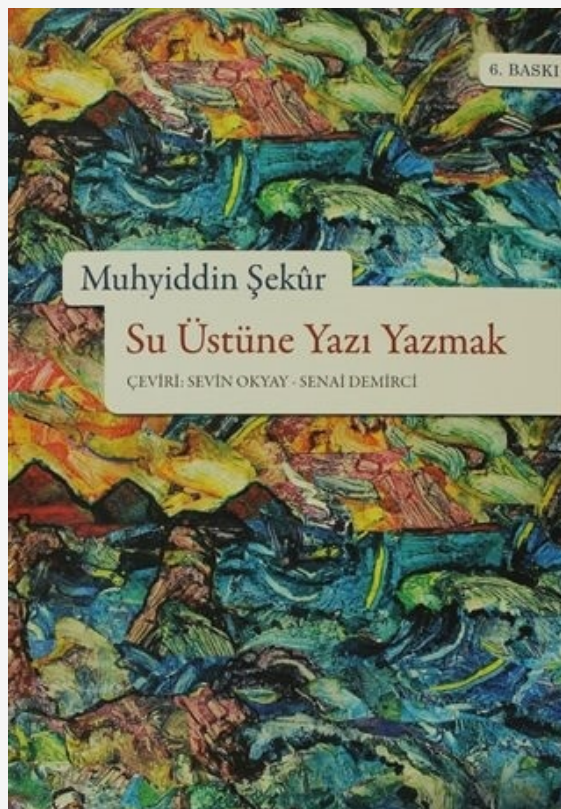




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"The writings people inscribe on stones for centuries are like writings inscribed on water for the sake of Allah."
